Civic Education

What It Generally Looks Like

- Only nine states and the District of Columbia require one year of U.S. government or civics.
- Thirty-one states only require a half-year of civics or U.S. government education, and 10 states have no civics requirement.
- Focused on cognitive skills and concrete knowledge
- Limited experiential learning or local problemsolving components



What Research Tells Us

- Young people are interested in politics and voting, but there's a "follow-through" gap
 - 70% of individuals under 24 who can vote don't
 - 20% who are eligible to register to vote don't
- 18–29-year-olds account for 22% of the voting population, but only 13% vote
- 28% age gap in presidential elections, 37% age gap in midterm elections, and up to 50% age gap in local elections.
- Age-based gaps in voter turnout bias public policy to favor older voters' preferences

The Problem

The Follow-Through Gap

- Follow-through requires
 - knowledge: how to register, where to vote, how to vote, rules around voting
 - noncognitive skills grit, with-it-ness,
 delayed gratification, value of action
- Voting doesn't occur in a vacuum.
 - Policy
 - Structure
 - Practice

Research indicates that people of color and those living with poverty are disproportionately impacted by obstacles and barriers to voting.

PLACES




Locating their polling sites, getting to their polling sites, and understanding how date impacts location

PRACTICALITY




Having the time and the ability to actually get to polling sites when their days are accounted for




Where Education Comes In

How We Can Help

- Focus on practical skills and knowledge
- Be thoughtful on timing
 - Classroom instruction on voter registration
 - Instructional time to engage in elections and election information
- Explicitly explain voter registration and the voting process, and support it

2020 Primaries	6,980	4,258	59.68%
2022 Primaries	7,039	3,693	52.5%

In 2020, GCS had just around 1000 students take advantage of early voting.

In 2022, GCS had 1,510 students completed voter registration forms during voter registration and education programming. 541 students took advantage of early voting transportation.
